A Word of Warning

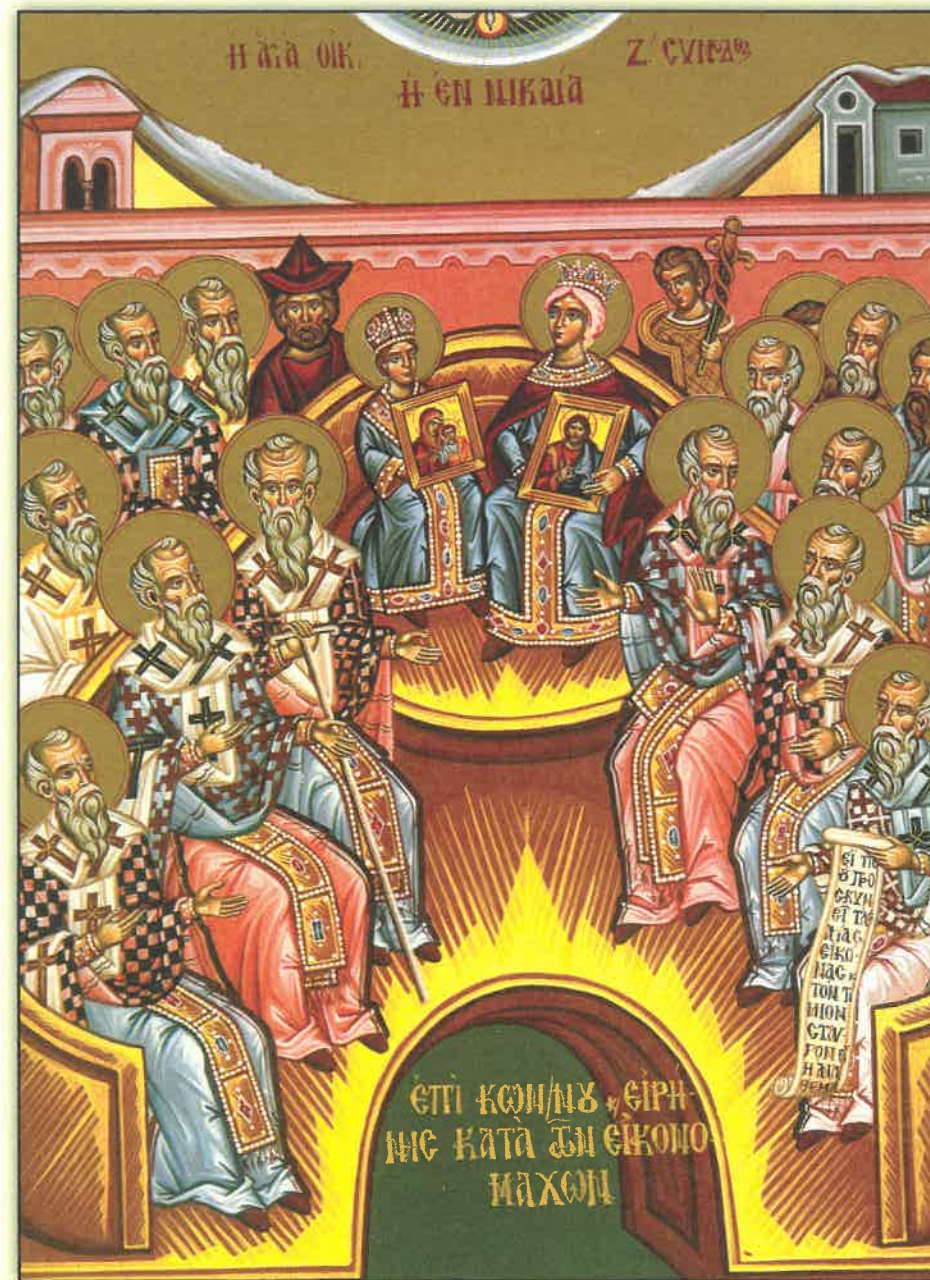

In fact, the more we progress, the more hardships we shall have to endure in this world; for when our love for the present world dies, its sufferings increase. This is why we see many people doing good works and at the same time struggling under a heaven burden of afflictions.

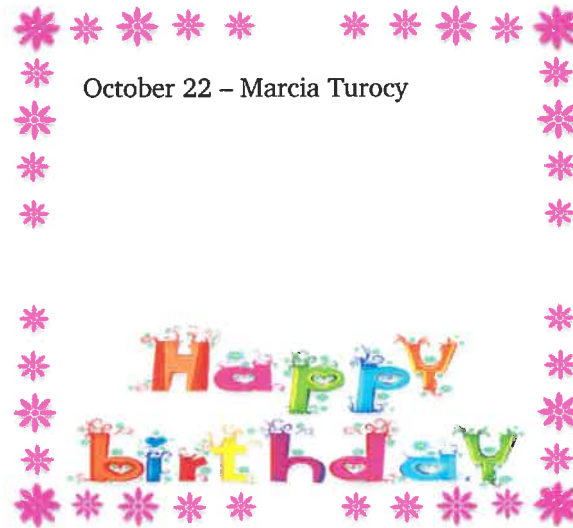

Do you have an Icon Corner in your home?

Remember that the Altar is to a Church what an Icon Corner is to a home. The home is our domestic Church. The Icon Corner is a reminder of who we are: We are children of God. Just as we have photo albums full of pictures of family members, we should also have pictures of our God and the Saints to remind us who we are and who we are to become. The Icon Corner in each home also provides a place where the family can come together to

pray. The family that prays together stays together.

Our homes are to be a place of prayer; therefore, each Christian home should have an “Icon Corner”. This constitutes the Home Altar or Family Shrine. It serves as the focal point for prayer. The Icon Corner usually consists of a table, stand or shelf with a linen or other cloth covering. Over the table are the Icons of Our Lord (on the right) and Our Lady (on the left), often with a crucifix in-between. Other Icons of personal choice may and should flank the Icon Corner. A perpetual candle can be burned if it is not a safety hazard. Otherwise, candles are lit during times of prayer. Placed on the table are normally the following items: a Festal Icon depicting the season; the Bible; prayer books; holy water; blessed candles; the blessed palms and willows from Palm Sunday; flowers from the Feast of the Dormition and a prayer rope (chotki). The Icon Corner is placed in a prominent room, such as the living room or the family room. Traditionally, it faces east, if such an arrangement is possible.

Remember that the Icon Corner consecrates the entire household and everyone living in it to the service and glory of God. The many Icons of the Icon Corner remind us of the great Cloud of Witnesses who make intercession before us at the Throne of Almighty God. They recall to us that we are never alone as members of the Body of Christ, that even death cannot separate us, not now, not ever. Our Home Church reminds us that, as Christians, our main priority in life is to live to God’s Glory. On this Sunday of Orthodoxy let us remember that the Icon Corner is a powerful way of making present to us the Icon or Image of God the Father Who is our Lord, God and Savior, Jesus Christ. Through our pious use of this spiritual treasure, we are ourselves, little by little, made Icons and Temples of the Holy Spirit!

Celebrating the 7th Ecumenical Council today

The Seventh Ecumenical Council was held in Nicea September 24-October 23, 787. It was the Second Ecumenical Council held in the city of Nicea and is also known as the Second Council of Nicea. In the eighth century an outburst of heated controversy concerning the sacred images, the holy icons: Were they true worship, or were they idolatry which is forbidden by the Ten Commandments? The conflict broke out in 730 when Byzantine Emperor Leo III order the destruction of icons. This action met with great opposition especially from the monastic community. This controversy raged through the succeeding decades. Upon the accession to the throne of Empress-Regent Irene who favored the veneration of the holy icons, an Ecumenical Council was called to judge what the teaching regarding the holy images should be. The Seventh Council did not merely declare that using the holy images was acceptable. Rather, they went so far as to declare that refusal to use the holy icons and to venerate the holy images is a denial of the incarnation of the Word of God, Jesus Christ! The Council went on to solemnly define that the veneration of images is quintessentially true worship. The seventh session of the Council held on October 13 formulated this decree which is why the Church still reserves the Sunday between October 11-17 for the commemoration of the Holy Fathers who participated in this 7th Ecumenical Council.

Before Warhol Anthony Kubek and Carpatho-Rusyn American Art A Lecture by Dr. Nick Kupensky

While Andy Warhol is the most well-known Carpatho-Rusyn American artist, he was not the first. Indeed, the first generation of Carpatho-Rusyn immigrants was not only made up of miners and millworkers but also classically trained artists as well. This lecture tells the story of Anthony Kubek (1885-1971), a Greek Catholic priest trained in Munich and Budapest who established himself as a painter and muralist in the new world. Kubek's religious paintings, rural and urban landscapes, and still lifes reveal the unique contributions of Carpatho-Rusyns to American visual art.

Dr. Nick Kupensky is an associate professor of Russian at the United States Air Force Academy and the vice president of the Carpatho-Rusyn Research Center. A native of Brookfield, Ohio, he received his B.A. (2007) from Bucknell University and an M.Phil. (2011) and Ph.D. (2017) from Yale University. His research on Soviet, Ukrainian, and Carpatho-Rusyn art has been published by *Slovo*, *Ukraina Moderna*, *Nationalities Papers*, *Harvard Ukrainian Studies*, *H-Ukraine*, and *e-International Relations*.
