

Many Calls for the Chosen

The first call that shaped St. Andrew's life was the very timing and place of his birth. The second call that shaped Andrew's life came through John the Baptist. Andrew must have been an alert young man longing for the coming of the Messiah when he first heard the preaching of John. Andrew's third call came from Jesus himself. The fourth call that shaped Andrew's life was to follow Jesus, to be his disciple, a student in daily contact with Jesus, walking and talking with him, listening and learning from the Master, as from a Rabbi. The fifth call that changed Andrew's life was his selection by Jesus as one of the twelve apostles, to give witness, to preach, to bring others to Christ. Andrew, the student, was chosen to become a teacher sent by Christ. His sixth call came through pious Greeks at the Passover in Jerusalem. They wanted to see Jesus, to be introduced to him. The boy from Bethsaida began using his language skills, his understanding of Greek and Roman culture, to bring Gentiles to Jesus. St. Gregory Nazianzen, St. Jerome, and St. Paulinus tell us that after Pentecost Andrew became an apostle to people in the land of Greece, the bordering lands, and as tradition tells us, ultimately to Byzantium. The final call in Andrew's life was to martyrdom by crucifixion on an X shaped cross at Patras in Achaia.

Saint Andrew's vocation, and ours as well, wasn't given all at once, but gradually. Seven calls from the Lord built one upon the other throughout the course of his life. Andrew's response to each call gave new shape to his life and prepared him for the next gift of God. This courageous young man, by purity of heart and docile obedience to God's will became in St. Bede's words, "The Introducer to Christ." He introduced his brother to Jesus, and the Greeks and Scythians.



The 26th Sunday After Pentecost

In the gospel story today, Jesus cures a crippled woman on the Sabbath. She had, for



eighteen years, been suffering from a back infirmity. She then gave thanks to God and proclaimed his glory throughout the town. We also must remember to be thankful to our Lord. We should give gratitude to our Lord who has given us many gifts and blessings. Yet, in the world today, there are many people who never give thanks to God. Even in the gospel stories we see many thankless people. For instance, the Gospel of Matthew records that Jesus cured ten lepers. But out of the ten persons, only one returned to Jesus and gave him thanks for his cure. Jesus then said to him, "Where are the others?" It seems like the others just used Jesus for their own selfish ends. We of course should never imitate these ungrateful lepers. Another important point in the gospel story is that the synagogue official was not healed of his bent heart. He got very angry at Jesus when he cured the woman on the Sabbath. The Lord, in turn, called him a

hypocrite. He was so self-righteous to himself that he did not recognize that he had defects. For on thing, he did not show any compassion to the crippled woman. He just wanted to glorify himself in front of the people. Do we sometimes in life repeat the same actions of this cold Pharisee? Maybe we are too quick to judge other persons in their faults, but do not see our own sins. The Lord has told us that all judgment shall be done by him at the day of reckoning. People who harshly condemn others need to have their hearts cured by the healer of souls, Jesus Christ. The Lord has instituted the sacrament of penance for this reason. No matter how much evil we have done in this life, the Lord will always forgive and be merciful to you. In the Second Book of chronicles, it is recorded that there was an evil man who needed a cure of heart. King Manasseh who reigned for 55 years in Jerusalem after the good king Hezekiah, was a cruel man. Tradition says that he sawed the prophet Isaiah in half. He practiced sorcery, magic, witchcraft and introduced necromancers and wizardry. He also caused his sons to pass through the fire. This meant that he scarified his own sons in a bloody ritual to the pagan gods of Baal. The Lord God in turn sent the despotic Assyrians to punish him and his people. He was taken captive to the city of Ninevah in chains. In his distress, the king humbles himself and implores the Lord for mercy and forgiveness. He asks the Lord to heal his heart. The Lord God then has compassion on him. The Lord God forgave him and gave his kingship back to him. The king then lived a life that was pleasing to God. In spite of his wickedness, the Lord was merciful.

3rd week of spiritual preparation for Christmas

We now enter the third week of our spiritual journey to Bethlehem where the Christ Child is to be born. During this penitential time known as **The Philippian Fast** (Advent), the Church commemorates the fact that the pious patriarchs and the just people of the Old Testament were waiting with anxious and persevering anticipation for the coming of the Messiah. Their period of watchfulness and expectation was characterized by prayer and penitential acts in order that they would be prepared worthily to greet the long awaited Savior. May we thus make a conscientious effort to self-impose various penitential practices (prayer, fasting, and charitable giving) during these days before Christmas as well.
