#### Celebrate and Be Glad





#### World Day of Peace – January 1st

Every year on January 1st, the Holy Father marks the World Day of Peace with a special message inviting all people to reflect on the important work of building peace. This year's message is the latest in a long tradition of messages for this day that began with St. Paul VI in 1967 and continued with St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, and Pope Francis. "Artificial Intelligence and Peace" is the theme of this year. The remarkable advances made in the field of artificial intelligence are having a rapidly increasing impact on human activity, personal and social life, politics and the economy. Pope Francis calls for an open dialogue on the meaning of these new technologies, endowed with disruptive possibilities and ambivalent effects. He recalls the need to be vigilant and to work so that a logic of violence and discrimination does not take root in the production and use of such devices, at the expense of the most fragile and excluded: injustice and inequalities fuel conflicts and antagonisms. The urgent need to orient the concept and use of artificial intelligence in a responsible way, so that it may be at the service of humanity and the protection of our common home, requires that ethical reflection be extended to the sphere of education and law. The protection of the dignity of the person, and concern for a fraternity effectively open to the entire human family, are indispensable conditions for technological development to help contribute to the promotion of justice and peace in the world.

#### The Feast of our Lord's Circumcision - January 1st



The eighth day following His birth, the Divine Child was presented in the Temple and circumcised according to the Law existing in Israel since the time of Abraham. On this occasion, He was given the name Jesus, which the Archangel Gabriel announced to the All-Holy Virgin Mary. The Old Testament circumcision was the proto-type of the New Testament baptism. The circumcision of our Lord shows that He received upon Himself the true body of man and not just seemingly, as was later taught of Him by heretics. Our Lord was also circumcised because He wanted to fulfill the entire Law which He Himself gave through the prophets and forefathers.

#### The Feast of Saint Basil the Great – January 1st

Basil was born during the reign of Emperor Constantine. While still unbaptized, Basil spent fifteen years in Athens where he studied philosophy, rhetoric, astronomy and all other secular sciences of that time. His colleagues at that time were Gregory the Theologian and Julian, later the apostate emperor. In his mature years he was baptized in the river Jordan along with Euvlios his former teacher. He was Bishop of Caesarea in Cappadocia for almost ten years and completed his earthly life fifty years after his birth. He was a great defender of the true faith, a great light of moral purity, a religious zealot, a great theological mind, a great builder and pillar of the Church of God. Basil fully deserved the title "Great." Numerous works of this Father of the Church are preserved; they include theological, apologetical, ascetical and canonical writings as well as the Holy and Divine Liturgy named after him. This Divine Liturgy is celebrated ten times throughout the year. St. Basil died percentally of



Liturgy is celebrated ten times throughout the year. St. Basil died peacefully on January 1, 379 A.D., and was translated into the Kingdom of Christ.

### Happy New Year To All Our Parishioners & Friends

#### The baptism of Jesus, holy Theophany - Obligation

It was on January 6th that Christ was made known as the Son of God. It was on this day that



our Lord appeared before John the Baptist in the River Jordan and asked to be baptized-not that He was sinful or needed to be cleansed through Baptism, but that He might teach us the importance and necessity of this great sacrament. While He was being baptized, the Holy Spirit descended upon Him in the form of a dove and the voice of the Father was heard from heaven saying: "This is my beloved Son, with Whom I am well-pleased." Thus on this day not only does Heaven tell us that Christ is God, but we see God manifested in the Holy Trinity. We have before the three persons of the Godhead: the Son, being

baptized in the River Jordan, the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove, and the voice of the Father in heaven: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This is the meaning of the great feast of Theophany - the showing forth of God in three Persons. At Christmas, we saw Christ as a new-born babe. This week on Theophany, we will see Him a full-grown man of 30 beginning His ministry among people. Today the Little Entrance of the Divine Liturgy is expanded into a full celebration. It is in this act of coming forth from the Holy Altar and carrying the Gospel aloft, that the priest represents Jesus Christ coming forth to bring the Gospel of Salvation to all. The Little Entrance of the Divine Liturgy is in reality a Little Theophany. On this great Feast of the Theophany, the Church of Christ calls all of us to go together to the river Jordan to witness the manifestation of God and the Baptism of our Lord Jesus Christ. There we shall see, with the eyes of our soul, our Lord immersing Himself once again in the waters of the River Jordan, and thus sanctifying the oceans and the rivers and the lakes of all the world. Join us on Friday, January 5th at 6:00 p.m. for the Obligation Holyday Divine Liturgy. Holyday in Hermitage is Saturday morning, January 6th at 9:00 a.m.

#### The great sanctification of water on Friday evening

The most outstanding liturgical aspect with regard to the Feast of the Holy Theophany is the Great Sanctification of Water. The colorful and elaborate ceremony for sanctifying the waters commemorates Jesus' descent into the River Jordan and begins with the reading of three paremias taken from the Holy Prophet Isaiah which foreshadow the baptism of Christ. A lengthy prayer that is attributed to Saint Sophronios, the Patriarch of Jerusalem, is interrupted three times: once when the priest blesses the water with the trojca, a three-branched burning candlestick; then again when he breaths upon the water in the form of a cross; and finally when he blesses the water by making the circus of the cross with his hand in it. At the end of the cross when



the sign of the cross with his hand in it. At the end of the ceremony, he submerges the hand-cross into the water, making the sign of the cross with it while singing the troparion of the feast. The priest then sprinkles the church and the entire congregation with the newly-sanctified Jordan waters. The faithful then come forward to be blessed with the water, to drink it, and to take some of it into their homes.

#### Seasonal Christian greeting beginning on Friday

The greeting that we salute each other with is **CHRIST IS BAPTIZED!** (Christós Krescajetsja) The response is **IN THE JORDAN!** (Vo Jordani!). This is also the greeting we use for mirovanije.

#### Did you attend church for Christmas???

The first precept of the Church teaches that the Christian faithful attend The Divine Liturgy on ALL Sundays of the year, as well as on ALL Holydays of Obligation. Besides ALL Sundays, there are 5 Holy Days of Obligation in our Byzantine Catholic Church. Christmas was a Holyday of Obligation. Did you attend Church? Only a serious or honorable reason should've prevented you from attending. When you purposely miss a Sunday (Sat. vigil) or Holyday of Obligation without a serious or honorable reason or dispensation from a priest, the Church teaches you are in the state of sin. The Sacrament of Confession is the remedy for this.
