Physicians Who Work for Free

On November 1st, we celebrate the feast of two remarkable brothers who lived during the early years of the Christian Church. Cosmas and Damian were born of wealthy parents in Asia Minor who gave their sons the best education in the Roman Empire.

They were interested in medicine and became physicians at an early age. During this same time, the two brothers also became Christians. Their unique combination of medicine and prayer attracted the attention of many. Through their commitment to Christ they endeavored to become healers not only of the body, but of the soul as well. Consequently, their fame spread and they soon developed a reputation as being miracle-workers who could heal with an herb as well as with a prayer.

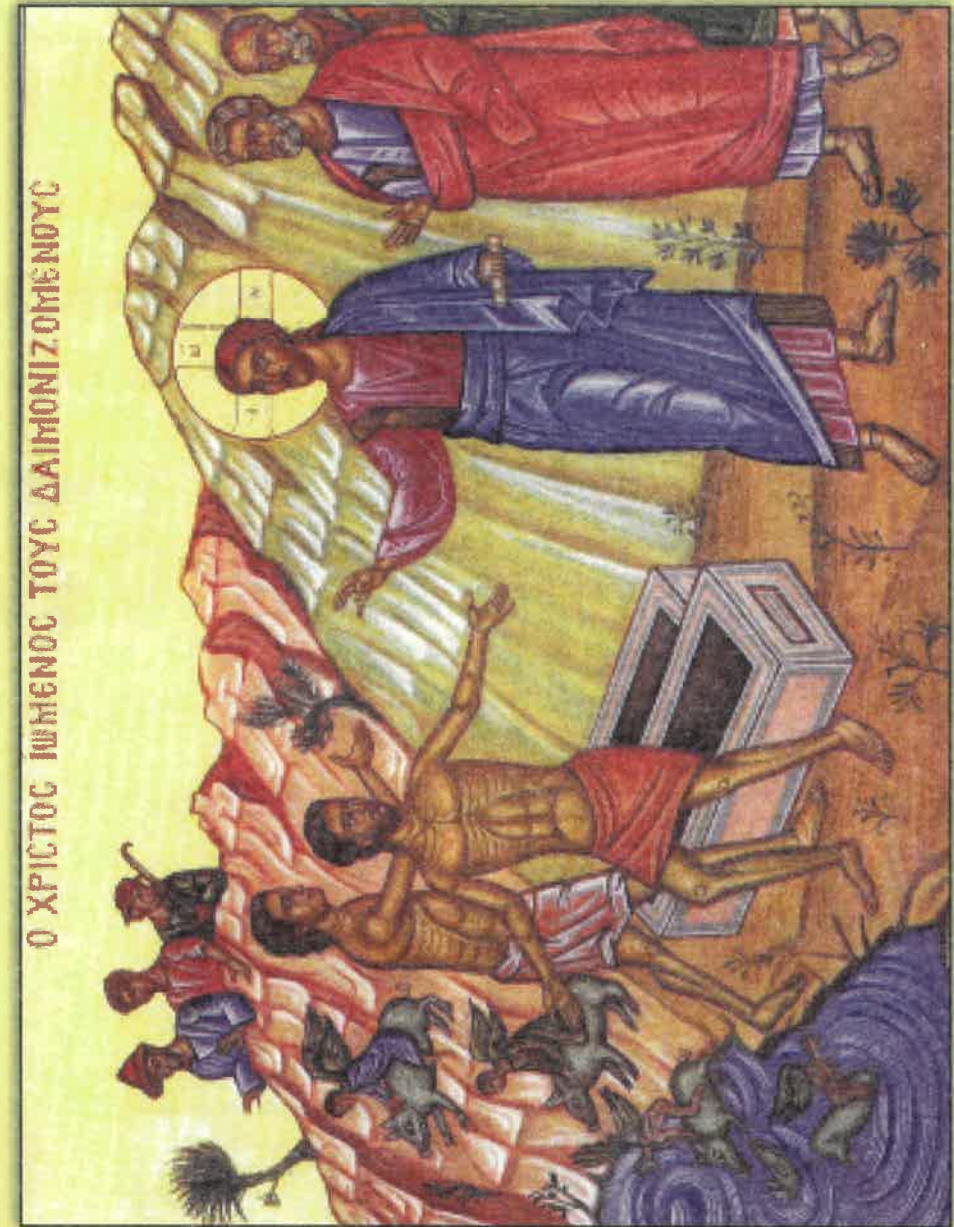
About this same time, the brothers made a

most unique pledge: they pledged not to take any money for their services. They healed thousands of people from diseases of body and soul and never accepted anything for their efforts. Their reputation spread even more rapidly as they became known as "unmercenaries" – someone who does not expect payment of any kind in return for services rendered.

In a sense, each of us can become unmercenaries in the same spirit as were Saints Cosmas and Damian. Each of us can freely give something of ourselves without expecting anything in return. Perhaps we can give our time to a person in need without expecting an equal favor in return. Perhaps we can freely give advice without being offended if it is not followed. Or, perhaps we can give the gift of forgiveness without receiving an apology in return.

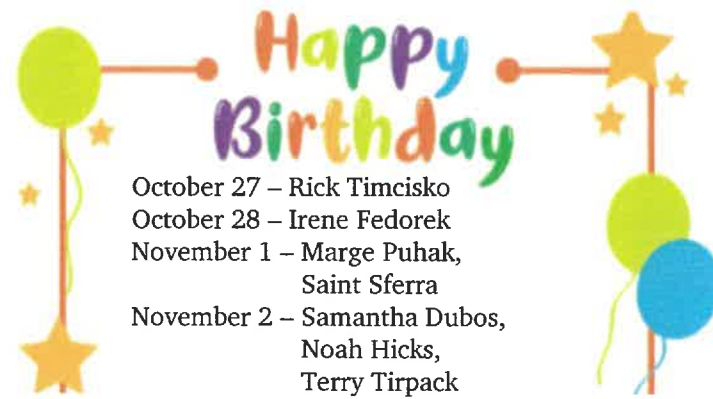

LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR

-St. Michael Hall & Church Buildings Fire Code Violations-

Dear Parishioners:

Last Monday, October 21st, the City of Campbell Fire Chief Stephen Dubic, inspected our Church Building and our St. Michael Hall Building. The inspection is mandated of all public buildings in the city. After receiving the completed report along with pictures of violated areas, we have **15 Violations** that are going to require corrective actions. If not corrected within the next several weeks, we are then reported to the State, and then fined per day until all corrective measures are met.

Most of the violations are at the Hall. The most serious violation is the ansul system and hood above the kitchen stove. The safety system is so old, the extinguishers we have aren't even manufactured or used anymore. I have already begun the process of contacting the company needed to update the system. I am waiting to hear if the hood needs replaced as well. Without a proper inspected safety system above the stove, we are not allowed to use the stove at all.

There are electrical issues at the Hall that are hazardous and in violation as well. I will be working with an electrician to correct those.

A majority of the violations have to do with "general housekeeping" such as storage, blocked walkways, and blocked access to control panels. Below is a work schedule that we will throw away and re-organize items so these issues will be corrected. I am kindly asking for volunteers to help.

As far as the Church building, corrective measures have already begun. There are two additional fire extinguishers (narthex and choir loft) that have been installed this past week. Also, exit signs will soon be installed above both side doors and narthex doors. Furthermore, most of the items in the church furnace room must be taken out. I will work with our sacristans and decorating team to find alternate space for what we have currently stored there.

Once everything is corrected, areas must remain orderly and stable, especially at the Hall. Please offer whatever time you can, and I would like everything corrected by early December.

Honoring Christ The King

Pope Pius XI instituted The Feast of Christ the King in 1925 in his encyclical Quas Primas. Pope Pius connected the denial of Christ as king to the rise of secularism. At the time of Quas Primas, secularism was on the rise, and many Christians, even Catholics, were doubting Christ's authority, as well as the Church's, and even doubting Christ's existence. Pius XI, and the rest of the Christian world, witnessed the rise of dictatorships in Europe, and saw Catholics being taken in by these earthly leaders. Just as the Feast of Corpus Christi (honoring Christ's Most Pure Body) was instituted when devotion to the Eucharist was at a low point, the Feast of Christ the King was instituted during a time when respect for Christ and the Church was waning, when the feast was most needed. In fact, it is still needed today, as these problems have not vanished, but instead have worsened. Thus, Jesus knew the oppressive nature of secular kings, and in contrast to them, he connected his role as king to humble service, and commanded his followers to be servants as well. In other passages of Scripture, his kingdom is tied to his suffering and death. While Christ is coming to judge the nations, his teachings spell out a kingdom of justice and judgment balanced with radical love, mercy, peace, and forgiveness. When we celebrate Christ as King, we are celebrating one willing to die for humanity and whose "loving-kindness endures forever." Christ is the king that gives us true freedom, freedom in Him. The Byzantine Catholic faithful who have immigrated to our country at the turn of the last century from Uzhorod and Presov have always celebrated on this special devotion as they currently do today. May we honor Christ the King by rededicating our lives back to Him.



Happy Halloween this Thursday

Halloween has a long history in the Christian West. The very word "Halloween" is a shortened form of "All Hallow's Eve". Who are the hallowed ones? ALL GOD'S SAINTS! The Saints of the Church are not only those honored throughout the year with a feast day on the Liturgical calendar. There are many Saints without the formal recognition of the Church through the process of canonization-glorification, but who are clearly recognized as "holy" by those who knew them. To commemorate these Saints the Christian West developed this official day in their calendar. Another reason why "All Hallow's Eve" developed in the Church was as a response to the various superstitious beliefs and practices surrounding death. Remember that October 31st is not "the night of the living dead"...that's Hollywood presenting fiction. We are much surrounded by the secular pagan world and much of what happens on Halloween is far from spiritual. At home, take the time to carefully examine the history of Halloween. Strongly avoid any pagan occults and keep yourself, your children, grandchildren, loved ones far away from the evil aspects of Halloween. Remember that when we the believers, the faithful participate in anything (even Halloween), our attitudes and behavior should glorify Christ. St. Paul reaffirms this when he says to all of us: "Only, conduct yourselves in a way worthy of the gospel of Christ." (Philippians 1:27)
