

A Peaceful Ending of Our Lives

Surely the secret of true life is to accept each state as it comes. To die the death and to live the new life, not to cling to the past but to live with total integrity in the present. Now in all these cases out of dving there comes resurrection. Not loss but enrichment, not decay but growth. Something dies means something comes alive. May not the death that comes right at the end of our life, fit into that pattern? May not our bodily death be the final stage in our growth? The last and greatest in the long series of deaths and resurrections, that we have been experiencing ever since the day we were born. If the small deaths each lead beyond death to resurrection, may this not be true of the great death that awaits us when we finally leave this world? May this not be the greatest passover? Then we should enlarge our vision, we should look beyond our own life stories to the Christ story. We should relate the death and resurrection pattern within our own life to the death and resurrection of Jesus our Savior. Our story makes sense in the light of His story. Our small deaths and resurrections are joined across history through His definitive death and resurrection. What do we hear at Paschal midnight? "Let none fear death, for the death of the Savior has set us free. He has destroyed death by undergoing death. Christ is risen and death reigns in fear. Christ is risen and there is none dead in the tomb."




and difficulties. Furthermore, people who are really successful are never satisfied with the level they have already attained, but persevere to achieve greater perfection.

We cannot just say "I'm a good person" and rest on our laurels the rest of our lives. We must act. We must help. We must perform. Is it difficult at times? Sure! We all fall on tough times, but our community—our Church—our family should always be there to help us rise up. In turn, we are part of that community, and we should be there to help others overcome their challenges and encourage them to keep going.

Our Eastern Church Father, St. Isaac the Syrian, gives us an understanding of what perseverance is for the Christian: "A time of trial is beneficial to everyone: the diligent are tried so that their wealth may increase; the lax, so that they may be preserved from harm; those spiritually asleep, so that they may prepare themselves for watchfulness; those whose who are far from God, so that they approach Him; those who are God's close associates, so that they may come closer to Him. . . . "

St. Paul tells the Romans (15: 5-7) that this goal is to persevere in interiorizing God's Love: "May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Welcome one another, therefore, as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God."

Ultimately, it is our choice whether we persevere toward success or fall into sloth and idleness toward failure. As we consider these messages of perseverance and think about our own situations in life, let us always remember to rely on God and His help. Whether or not we accept His help and guidance and listen to Him is ultimately our choice. As He guides and leads us, we should be His instruments of love and peace in the world, working toward not only building our own success, but striving to help others as well!
