
Commentary on Riches



Living Faith

There are two realities with which we, as Christians, must reflect on and come to terms with in our own lives—the reality of the existence of hell and the reality of our faith.



In our modern era, we find that the concept of hell is especially watered down; preachers hardly speak of it; people do not fear an eternity without God's presence, and our

relativist secular society tells us that there is always someone out there who is doing something worse than we are doing. These are indeed some grave fallacies that we fall into, perhaps to make ourselves feel better, perhaps to whitewash our own sinful natures.

When some come to church, they claim that all they want to hear about is how Jesus loves them, how they are good people; in short, they look for something to make them feel better. Our Lord does love us; we have so many signs of this, but bishops, priests, deacons, and other clergy, as spiritual doctors, have the obligation to make known to the faithful what awaits them if they bask in a life of corruption, of sin.

How would you feel if you were plagued by cancer and your doctor did not tell you? How would you feel if you had a strong case of pneumonia, potentially life-threatening, and your doctor withheld this information from you? The same is for the reality of everlasting life without our Lord. We do not want to be in the same situation in which the rich man finds himself—by then, it's too late, and the fires of hell leave him helpless, regretful, and thirsty.

The second reality, that of our faith must be in the Resurrection. We have the knowledge of the Resurrection of our Lord, we share in this each and every Pascha.

Unfortunately, a lot of people nowadays equate Pascha with getting a basket blessed and gorging on ham, kolbasi, cheese, eggs, and so forth. However, we have a Christian duty to recognize the importance of our Lord's Resurrection, the debt that He paid by dying on the cross for us and rising from the dead, so that WE may inherit eternal life and not end up in hell.

How often, on a daily basis, do we reject our own faith? How often do we not acknowledge the Resurrection of Christ, after descending to hell and freeing the patriarchs and prophets, Who came back to us so that we may more strongly believe in Him? How often do we look down on others, as the rich man in the Gospel, while refusing to help others and judging them?

May we be mindful of our own lives and our own deeds. May we be resolved to live as better Christians, not only in name, but in how we treat others. May we worthily celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord and share the joy of this Resurrection It's never too late! And it's definitely never too late to live out our calling as faithful Byzantine Catholics, to go forth and to change the world through our examples of compassion and love for each other.

Holyday of the Entrance of the Theotokos

When the Most-holy Virgin Mary reached the age of three, her holy parents Joachim and Anna



took her from Nazareth to Jerusalem to dedicate her to the service of God according to their earlier promise. It was a three-day journey from Nazareth to Jerusalem but, traveling to do a God-pleasing work, this journey was not difficult for them. Leading the procession into the Temple were virgins with lighted tapers in their hands, then the Most-holy Virgin, led on one side by her father and on the other side by her mother. The virgin was clad in vesture of royal magnificence and adornments as was befitting the King's daughter, the Bride of God" (Psalm 45:13-15). Following them were many kinsmen and friends, all with lighted tapers. Fifteen steps led up to the Temple. Joachim and Anna lifted the Virgin onto the first step, then she ran quickly to the top herself, where she was met by the High Priest Zachariah, who was to be the

father of St. John the Forerunner. Taking her by the hand, he led her not only into the Temple, but into the "Holy of Holies," the holiest of holy places, into which no one but the high priest ever entered, and only once each year, at that. Mary's parents then offered sacrifice to God according to the Law, received the priest's blessing and returned home. The Most-holy Virgin remained in the Temple and dwelt there for nine full years.
