Publican and Pharisee: Humility vs Self-Righteousness

This parable represents to us two chariots on the race course, each with two charioteers in it. In one of the chariots it places righteousness with pride, in the other sin and humility. You see the chariot of sin outstrip that of righteousness, not by its own strength but by the excellence of humility combined with it, but the other is defeated not by righteousness, but by the weight and swelling of pride.

For as humility by its own elasticity rises above the weight of pride, and leaping up reaches to God, so pride by its great weight easily depresses righteousness. Although therefore you are earnest and constant in well doing, yet think you may boast yourself, you are altogether devoid of the fruits of prayer. But you that bears a thousand loads of guilt on your conscience, and only


think this thing of yourself that you are the lowest of all men, shall gain much confidence before God.



God's Time

Often, when we worry about time, we are doing something that we don't like, such as counting down the time until the end of the work or school day, or pressed for time when traffic is bad or our flight is delayed or if we are late for a meeting, or even when we are waiting for some trial in our life to pass. We generally do not worry about time when we are enjoying something or caught up in a moment.

Why, then, do we concern ourselves with time when it comes to God and prayer? How often do we ask or hear someone ask "how long is this service going to be?" Or "how long is this actually going to take... I have things to do?" Is it that we do not enjoy the time we spend with God, in His presence, in His House? Is it that we do not want to be with Him? Hopefully, this is not the case. Eternity is a long time.

Think about it. This Sunday, people will be willing to spend countless hours glued to their television set for the Super Bowl. There will be parties and gatherings, and most will not be concerned with time—even with having to go to work on Monday morning. Yet, how many will begrudge the time they spend in church?

In the Divine Liturgy, we sing that we "set aside all cares of life" to remind ourselves that God's time is eternal; it is a beautiful experience that we are invited to. We are invited to this because it is an opportunity to lay all of worries, cares, fears, animosities, sinful desires, all of the things that weigh us down at His feet. One of these cares is, in fact, time. We certainly can not focus on prayer if we are constantly looking at our watch or thinking about other things that we need to do. Our Lord wants us to approach Him willingly and unreservedly. If we concern ourselves with "how long" this will take, we undermine the purpose of accepting His invitation. Think about last Sunday's Gospel and recall that Zacchaeus willingly sought our Lord, accepted His invitation to dinner (without asking Christ how long He intends to stay with him), and changed his life to serve our Lord.

This lesson shows contrition; it shows a change of heart; it shows a strong desire to serve and change a way of life. What a great example for us! Let us try to change our outlook, especially with Great Fast approaching, and make the time for God. Let us renew ourselves and seek to do His will in our prayers, actions, and words. Let us explore and experience the beauty of being in God's House, without the worry of earthly cares and the things of this world bogging us down. And, finally, let us share this joy with others and embrace the beauty and awesome mystery that is our faith without relating it to temporal worries and cares.

Who is St. Valentine?

The ancient martyrology of the Church of Rome marks February 14th as the remembrance of "the martyr Valentine, presbyter of Rome" (Valentinus mean "vigorous" in Latin). St. Valentine lived in Rome in the third century and was a priest who helped the martyrs during the persecution of Emperor Claudius II the Goth. The great virtue and catechetical activities of the saint had become familiar. For this, he was arrested and brought before the imperial court.

"Why, Valentine, do you want to be a friend of our enemies and reject our friendship?" asked the emperor. Then the saint replied "My lord, if you knew the gift of God, you would be happy together with your empire and would reject the worship of idols and worship the true God and His Son Jesus Christ."

The emperor, however, continued his questions with curiosity, and found a welcome opportunity to finally learn what the faith of these Christians was. Valentine then found the courage to urge him to repent for the blood of the Christians that was shed. "Believe in Jesus Christ, be baptized and you will be saved, and from this time forward the glory of your empire will be ensured as well as the triumph of your armory." Claudius became convinced, and said to those who were present: "What a beautiful teaching this man preaches." But the mayor of Rome, dissatisfied, began to shout: "See how this Christian mislead our Prince."

Then Claudius brought the saint to another judge. He was called Asterios, and he had a little girl who was blind for two years. Listening about Jesus Christ, that "He is the Light of the World", he asked Valentine if he could give that light to his child. St. Valentine put his hand on her eyes and prayed: "Lord Jesus Christ, true Light, illuminate this blind child." The child saw! So the judge with all his family confessed Christ. Having fasted for three days, he destroyed the idols that were in the house and finally received holy baptism.

When the emperor heard about all these events, he initially thought not to punish them, but thought that in the eyes of citizens he will look weak, which forced him to betray his sense of justice. So St. Valentine along with other Christians, after they were tortured, were beheaded on February 14th in the year 268.

The Great Fast begins March 3rd - Now is the time to start planning Lenten goals, meals, coming to church extra, etc.
