

So when Jesus said to the two sets of brothers, "Follow me," He was not calling them to leave a sport, or a hobby; he was asking them to leave their careers, their livelihoods, and their families! They had everything to lose.

What have we left behind to follow Him? Unless there's some pain, some discomfort, some sacrifice, then most probably we haven't left anything. Perhaps we're still fumbling about in our boats, tossing our nets over the side, and business goes on as usual.

Yet, if we do that, the Great Fisherman might leave us and move on to someone else, and the choice might go by forever.



The Call of the First Disciples

The ancient Greeks have provided for the world a valuable legacy of learning in all



branches of education, philosophy and scientific discipline. In the fifth century before Christ, two famous Athenian personalities met for the first time: Xenophon, a historian and general, and Socrates, an idealist philosopher. The legend of their first meeting locates the elderly Socrates walking in a narrow street of the city of Athens. He stops Xenophon, asking him where a certain type of merchandise could be obtained and where it was made. Xenophon gave the required information. Then, Socrates asked him: "Do

you know where men are made good and virtuous?" "No," said the young Xenophon. "Then," said Socrates, "follow me and learn!"

This Sunday's Gospel records the call by another, The Great Teacher, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, as He begins His public ministry. Saint Matthew describes quite simply the circumstances and personalities involved (Matt. 4:18-22). Jesus chose His disciples from among plain and ordinary folk, common fishermen, telling them that, in the future, they would become fishers of men.

He molded and instructed them carefully because His teaching and mission were not destined to end with Himself. It would be the task of His twelve apostles to continue His teaching and mission. He gave them power over the Kingdom of God and eternal life; they were enabled to bind and loose everything connected with the service of man's eternal destiny; they were to receive the Holy Spirit and the power to forgive sins or to retain them (John 20:21-23).

And when, at the Mystical Supper, He prefigured His sacrifice of the Cross under the symbols of bread and wine, He said to them, "Do this in memory of Me" (Luke 22:19). He gave them the injunction to baptize and to teach all nations. As His Father had sent Him, so He in turn sent them: He handed on to them His mission (Matt. 28:19-20). Jesus chose people not of great scholarship, influence, wealth or social background, but simple working people devoted to their task in life. They probably were not poor, but undoubtedly, they had little to give after taking care of their own needs. Yet they gave all of what and who they were to follow Christ and to teach others His ways.

Thinking back to Ancient Greece, there came to Socrates, a very ordinary man called Aeschines. "I am a humble soul," said Aeschines. "I have nothing to give, but I give myself." "Don't you see," said Socrates, "that you are giving me the most precious thing of all?" Jesus, too, needs ordinary folk who will give of themselves. The call of the first four disciples in Sunday's Gospel invites us to renew our response to discipleship in accordance with our present state of life. The challenge is raised to follow Christ, to live and spread His message, leading others to Him in accordance with the divine plan: "It is My Father's will that whoever sees the Son and believes in Him shall have eternal life" (John 6:40).

Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist on Tuesday

Six months before his appearing to the most holy Virgin Mary in Nazareth, the great Gabriel,



archangel of the Lord, appeared to Zachariah the High Priest in the Temple in Jerusalem. Before he revealed the miraculous conception by a virgin who had not known a man, the archangel revealed the wondrous conceiving by an old and barren woman. Zachariah was unable at once to believe the words of God's herald, and for this his tongue was bound in dumbness and remained thus until the eighth day after John's birth. The kinsfolk of Zachariah and Elizabeth gathered together on that day for the infant's circumcision and naming. When they inquired of the father how lie wished the child to be called, he, being still dumb, wrote on a slate: 'John'. At that moment his tongue was loosed and he began to speak. The news of the angel's appearing

to Zachariah, of his dumbness and of the loosening of his tongue at the exact moment that he wrote 'John', was carried throughout all Israel, coming to Herod's ears. So when he sent men to kill all the infants around Bethlehem, he sent men off to Zachariah's family house in the hills to slay John also. But Elizabeth hid the child in good time. The king was enraged at this, and sent an executioner to the Temple to kill Zachariah (for it was then his turn to serve in the Temple again). Zachariah was killed between the court and the Temple, and his blood clotted and solidified on the paving slabs, and remained as an enduring witness against Herod. Elizabeth hid herself and the child in a cave, where she soon died. The young John remained in the wilderness alone, in the care of God and His angels. The Holyday Liturgy will be celebrated on Tuesday, June 24th at 6:00 p.m.


