From the Acts of the Apostles


Then the apostles and presbyters, in agreement with the whole church, decided to choose representatives and to send them to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas. The ones chosen were Judas, who was called Barsabbas, and Silas, leaders among the brothers. This is the letter delivered by them: "The apostles and the presbyters, your brothers, to the brothers in Antioch, Syria, and Cilicia of Gentile origin: greetings. Since we have heard that some of our number [who went out] without any mandate from us have upset you with their teachings and disturbed your peace of mind, we have with one accord decided to choose representatives and to send them to you along with our beloved Barnabas and Paul, who have dedicated their lives to the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. So we are sending Judas and Silas who will also convey this same message by word of mouth: 'It is

the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us not to place on you any burden beyond these necessities, namely, to abstain from meat sacrificed to idols, from blood, from meats of strangled animals, and from unlawful marriage. If you keep free of these, you will be doing what is right. Farewell."

And so they were sent on their journey. Upon their arrival in Antioch they called the assembly together and delivered the letter. When the people read it, they were delighted with the exhortation. Judas and Silas, who were themselves prophets, exhorted and strengthened the brothers with many words. After they had spent some time there, they were sent off with greetings of peace from the brothers to those who had commissioned them. (Acts 15:22-33)


True Repentance & Healing

As we now are within the 2 week penitential season before the Dormition Feast, we know that each of us, as sinful humans, go through periods of spiritual weakness. We harbor bad thoughts, give into addictions, hurt others intentionally, revel in jealousy, greed, and hatred, and, to make matters worse sometimes, we even come up with excuses for our sinful deeds. We sin because we convince ourselves that it feels good. Or we excuse ourselves because, as the fallacy of common practice or bandwagon shows us, "everyone else does it, so it's OK." No one is immune to spiritual sickness—not even bishops, priests, monks, sisters, and so forth—and this is why prayer, all of our prayers, is essential for not only ourselves but also the world. The biggest trick of all of this is our ability to be honest with ourselves and, like going to a hospital or doctor, we need to WANT to get better.

Luckily for us, the Church is a hospital for the spiritually afflicted! However, much like a regular hospital, we must listen to the prescriptions of our doctors, those in charge of our spiritual care: our Lord, the Church Fathers, our confessor, our pastor, and our own spiritual fathers and mothers. We must exercise our souls daily and receive the nourishment of the Eucharist.

What is the typical prescription to get better? We know that we should pray, fast, and practice the corporal works of mercy. We know that we should love our neighbors. We know that we should bring others to the Light of Christ. However, all of these things should be purposeful and done in the spirit of Christ's teaching and example. Words alone or fasting because we "have to" or doing good deeds because the priest tells us to will not save our souls. Merely going through the motions of the Mystery of Repentance/Confession will not save us; we need to want to become better and resolve to avoid the sins we confess, and we to not only want this, but we also have to take action to be better!

Let us then resolve to be stronger Christians. Let us genuinely pray. Let us fast without complaint or misery. Let us do good deeds without expecting things in return. In this way, we can grow closer to God, and we can begin to treat the spiritual maladies that afflict us, and that afflict our world. Let us be shining examples of Christ's love and care for the world and work toward spiritually healing ourselves, not just today, but for every day for the rest of our earthly lives!



The Transfiguration of our Lord on Wednesday

Our Lord had spoken to His disciples many times not only concerning His Passion, Cross, and

Death, but also concerning the coming persecutions and afflictions that they themselves would endure. Since all these evils were near at hand, but the enjoyment of good things which they hoped to receive in their stead was yet to come, our Savior desired to give them full assurance, evidently and openly, concerning that glory which is prepared for those who endure to the end. Therefore, fulfilling that which He had promised shortly before, that "there be some standing here which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in His Kingdom" (Matt. 16:28), He took His three foremost disciples and ascended Mount Tabor, where He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as the light. Suddenly, together with this dread and marvelous effulgence of



light, there appeared those pinnacles of the Prophets, Moses and Elias, who spoke with the Lord Jesus concerning His saving Passion which was about to take place. Standing before Him as reverent servants, they showed that He is the Lord of both the living and the dead, for Moses came forth from Hades, having died many centuries before, and Elias, as it were from heaven, whither he had been taken up while yet alive. After a little while a radiant cloud overshadowed them and out of the cloud they heard that same voice which had been heard at the Jordan at the Baptism of Christ, testifying to the Divinity of Jesus and saying: "This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well-pleased; listen to Him".

The Solemn Blessing of fruits on Wednesday

According to our Byzantine Catholic custom, grapes along with other fruits are blessed for



the feast of our Lord's Transfiguration. Our forefathers, according to tradition, always waited for the Holy Day and would bring their first fruits to God's House (the Church) and give thanks for the harvest and ask God to bless their crops. To us, there is also a symbolic meaning in the blessing of fruits. As the seed of the fruit was planted and grew into trees and vines bearing fruits through many years of rain and sunshine under the protection of God and then brought forth fruit beautiful to look at and very good for taste and nourishment. In the same way, the seed of faith and belief in God is planted in our souls and is nourished through obedience to the

commandments of God and grows into a great Christian tree bearing good fruit (our good deeds). In a symbolic sense also, the ripening of the fruit on the tree is somewhat of a mirror of the miracle of the Transfiguration. In spring we see the empty branches burst forth with new green leaves around the Feast of Pentecost. Soon the tree is covered with beautiful flowers. In time, nature transforms these flowers into little buds of fruit and as the weeks pass, the buds are transfigured into beautiful and fully ripened fruit.
