
#### Invited to the Banquet

#### 5 things to examine our heart & soul

We probably are preparing our menus for Christmas dinner. We will be considering the meats to prepare, the side dishes and desserts, and we will be calculating the time it will take to prepare each item as well as the presentation of the dishes and even the placement of seats so that everyone can enjoy a meal together. Think about all of the time we spend in preparation for this meal: the prep work, the making of lists, the physical shopping from place to place, the hours of cooking... Imagine if we spent this much time taking inventory of our own lives in preparation for confession! So many of us use the excuse that we "don't have the time," yet when we look at life, we can easily see that we always have time for certain things, yet we never have the time for the others.

Aside of this, we do not consider all possibilities for examining our consciences. We tend to minimize sin, even normalize it, in our lives, and the careful examination we are to exercise becomes a last minute run to confession without preparation. Imagine cooking a Christmas dinner without preparation! That would be unacceptable to us, and making such a dinner would seem insurmountable. Now, consider how, metaphorically, our souls must look because of our lack of preparation.

Here are 5 things we should consider when examining our conscience.

- (1) I think that I am better than other people. This can be considered a sin of pride, and it is a very dangerous sin. When we think that we are better than others, we lack the empathy and understanding necessary to serve others, to love them, and to see Christ in them.
- (2) I can be ruthless to other people / I show no pity or compassion to others. Do I actually listen to others, or do I simply hear them? Do I demand that others apologize to me for my approval, whether or not they have done something wrong? Do I truly forgive others their trespasses as I expect God to forgive mine? Do I take the time to help, not judge, others who are in difficult circumstances and situations?
- (3) I do not pursue or work to understand God's will. As Christians, we are to do the Lord's work. In the Our Father, we say each and every time "Thy Will be done," yet do we actually believe these words? Are we trying to be in control when it is God Who is in control? Do we work against our pastor and other parishioners? Do we make a person's calling to God difficult to follow?
- (4) I am jealous of other people. When we see that someone has life, at least in our perception, easier, we can easily be jealous of them. After so long, we can even begin to disdain them or allow that hatred to turn to hurting them. It is important to understand ourselves and keep things in perspective, to appreciate the gifts that God has given us so that we do not allow the ugliness of jealousy to guide how we treat and/or talk about others.
- (5) I am angry with people. Christ preaches a Gospel of love, not anger. It is our calling in life to pray, to understand, to help, and to forgive. Carrying anger around in our hearts only works to destroy our own soul. The fires of anger then can never be quelled, and they begin to show in our interactions with others and the ways that we handle daily situations in our lives. Anger can ruin relationships, friendships, and other things in our lives. Most importantly, anger can work toward destroying our connection with God.

Think about these five things. Pray on them. Confess them if need be.
